THOUGHTS, EMOTIONS, & BEHAVIORS



In partnership with the Connecticut Opportunity Project, Dr. Luana Marques, and the Harvard team at Community Psychiatry PRIDE, Domus staff have

been engaged in learning TEB skills, which are based on Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and were developed specifically for youth development professionals to deliver to young people who are experiencing disengagement or disconnection. Beginning in August 2020, 16 Domus staff participated in our Wave 1 rollout of TEB in the organization. Staff underwent intense training and coaching to learn the five skills: Observe the TEB Cycle, Charge Up, Face Fears, Explore Thoughts, and Solve Problems.

Our Wave 1 data report from PRIDE indicated the following:

- · Our staff had 100% attendance at the TEB trainings.
- Our staff had 99% attendance at the TEB coaching sessions.
- \cdot We delivered 862 total TEB encounters to 56 youth.

"We have had an incredible Wave 1 implementation of TEB skills with the Domus team! The leadership and staff's commitment to the TEB skills has been palpable in the excitement and engagement that they brought every single training and coaching session. Just in Wave 1 alone, they also had 862 encounters that included the TEB skills with 56 youth! This is much higher than PRIDE has experienced with other partners so early into TEB implementation, which is a testament to Domus' dedication! We're incredibly excited to continue infusing TEB into every Domus program during Wave 2."

OUR VISION

No child shall be denied hope, love, or a fair chance in life.

Since 1972, **Domus** has helped thousands of young people experience success in school, the workplace, and life. We support young people who are disengaged or disconnected: defined as those who struggle with behavior and attendance at school, those who are not in school and not in the workforce or who were recently incarcerated.

Our long-term goal is that the young people are either employed, on a path to self-sufficient income, or enrolled and engaged in a post-secondary opportunity.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We have long believed, at Domus, that crisis is opportunity. As we approach what is hopefully the end of a long pandemic road, we have taken the opportunity to continue to strengthen the programs and services our organization offers and at the same time, continue to improve what we do.

This past year was spent bolstering all aspects of Domus. The Domus board of directors completed a self-assessment and a corresponding improvement plan. They also worked closely with senior staff to create a key performance indicator dashboard to track key metrics. Domus leadership re-wrote existing job descriptions to reflect the competencies necessary to be successful in each role in our organization. We continue to strengthen our staff and the delivery of services through best-in-class training. We completed our first training wave (first cohort of staff members in Thoughts, Emotions, & Behaviors training—a type of Cognitive Behavioral Training for youth workers) in partnership with Dr. Luana Margues and the Harvard team at Community Psychiatry PRIDE. We responded to the needs of the young people and families we serve by opening a drop-in center for young people to receive support during the uncertain days of hybrid instruction. We also hired a director of educational advocacy to ensure all our young people and their caregivers are supported in the educational process. It was a busy year, and we are motivated to make even more progress in the coming year.




2020-21 FINANCIALS (UNAUDITED)
